INFORMATION:

The Federal Highway Administration FHWA's regulations govern the national performance management measures and establish a methodology for measuring and reporting greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions associated with transportation (GHG measure). This rule added transportation related GHG reduction as a new National Highway System (NHS) performance measure. This entails requiring State Departments of Transportation (State DOT) and Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPO) to establish declining carbon dioxide (CO2) targets for the GHG measure and report on progress toward achieving those targets. Notably, the rule does not prescribe specific target levels; rather, it grants State DOTs and MPOs the flexibility to set targets suitable for their communities and aligned with their respective climate change and policy priorities, provided these targets aim to reduce emissions over time. The FHWA will evaluate whether State DOTs have made significant progress toward reaching their targets.

GHG Performance Targets under the rules:

State DOTs


• Establish declining 2-year and 4-year statewide (2 yr. target exempt 1st period).

MPOs

- Establish declining 4-year target for the metropolitan planning area.
- Option to commit to support the State DOT or establish unique quantifiable target.
- Have up to 180 days from when the State DOT established their targets.

MPOs in Urbanized Areas with Multiple MPOs.

- Establish an additional joint declining 4-year target for the urbanized area.
- Must be a single quantifiable target.





Data requirement to determine the GHG metric for biennial reporting include:

- 1. Annual total gallons of fuel consumed by fuel type (gasoline and diesel, and special fuels) based on fuel sales data for the calendar year. This data is available through <u>Fuels and Financial Analysis</u> <u>System Highways (Fuels & FASH)</u>.
- 2. CO2 emissions factors per volume of fuel. These emission factors are supplied by FHWA and posted on the <u>administration's website</u> by August 15 of each reporting year.
- 3. VMT estimates are from best available data that represent the calendar year and are consistent to the maximum extent practicable—with data submitted to HPMS. The reference year will use 2022 HPMS data, which was released November 30, 2023.



Proposed Transportation Improvement Program Amendment

Amendment Timeframe

The April 2024 amendment to the 2024-2029 Walla Walla Valley Metropolitan and Regional Transportation Improvement Program (M/RTIP) includes the years 2024 through 2027.

Projects Included

The April 2024 Amendment proposes adding STBG(BR) funding to the Walla Walla County and City of Walla Walla projects and reduced STBG/ FTA 5310 funding to the Oregon Department of Transportation project. Additional project details also shown in <u>Appendix A</u>.

Oregon Department of Transportation

Project Name: 23605 - OR CTUIR Funds Transfer FFY21

Amendment: Add a new transit project in the 2024-2027 M/RTIP as secured in the amount of \$229,764 in federal funds and \$229,764 in local funds for a total project cost of \$459,528.

Improvement: Walla Walla Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation 5307 allocation transferred to 5311 for federal fiscal year 2021. Projects will be administered by ODOT as the direct recipient.

Total Estimated Project Cost: \$459,528

Oregon Department of Transportation

Project Name: 21974 - Enhanced Mobility Program - Umatilla Co FFY22
Amendment: Increase project estimate by \$7,879 to match FTA grant/allocation amount.
Improvement: Enhanced mobility small urban program funding to improve transportation services to the special needs, seniors, and other transit-dependent populations in rural areas.
Total Estimated Project Cost: \$30,831

Washington Department of Transportation

Project Name: 512502R36 - SR 125/Plaza Way - Railroad Crossing Improvements **Amendment:** The amendment indicates that the funding for the PIN total and construction (CN) phase has increased, i.e., PIN total by \$864,805 and CN by \$710,310.

Improvement: The existing railroad crossing surface on SR 125 at Plaza Way in Walla Walla has deteriorated and needs to be replaced. Funding is for the reconstruction of the railroad crossing, add appropriate railroad safety devices, and construct sidewalk improvements to improve crossing safety and remove a gap in the active transportation network at this location.

Total Estimated Project Cost: \$3,045,30

Project Name: 573001G36 - US 730/3.0 Miles N of Oregon Border - Rockfall Prevention **Amendment:** The funding has increased for the RW by \$1,400 and construction phases by \$28,553. Additionally, the PIN total has increased by \$30,317. The partial construction phase has already been obligated and will be removed from the second WIN during the closure process. PE has already been obligated. The project length has changed from 0.21 to 0.25. Ending Termini changed from 3.11 to 3.15.

WWVMPO/SRTPO April 2024 Amendment to 2024-2029 M/RTIP

Improvement: WSDOT's geotechnical division has identified this unstable slope as a potential hazard to the traveling public based on recorded vehicle/ rock collisions and repeated call-outs to remove rocks from the roadway. This project will remove loose rocks, install rock bolts, wire mesh, concrete barrier, and flexible rockfall fence. These measures will reduce the potential for collisions by minimizing the risk of rocks reaching the roadway.

Total Estimated Project Cost: \$1,345,818

Project Prioritization

The projects programmed for implementation in the Walla Walla Valley region (see map in <u>Appendix B</u>), were selected and prioritized using a performance-based and data-driven process that considered project readiness, safety, system preservation, quality of life, connectivity, and efficiency impacts.

Important Findings

Funding Availability

The secured projects in the 2024-2029 M/RTIP must have committed sources of funding. Close coordination with the Oregon and Washington State Department of Transportations (ODOT and WSDOT), as well as other federal or state granting agencies, ensures that the M/RTIP is fiscally constrained.

In general, availability for Walla Walla Valley-specific Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG), Transportation Alternatives (TA), and Carbon Reduction Program (CRP) funds is tied to allocation provided through WSDOT. The following tables summarize the funding assumptions for the STBG, TA, and CRP programs from 2024 through 2027.

Funding availability for other sources of funds are tied to each project sponsor's demonstration of specific funding awards, which are routinely verified by WWVMPO/SRTPO staff.

Lastly, the DOTs will also review the amendment and the associated fiscal constraint prior to inclusion into their respective STIP during this amendment cycle.

Consistency with Local, Regional, and State Plans

The projects included in the April 2024 Amendment are consistent with the goals and objectives of local comprehensive plans, the Walla Walla Valley Metropolitan and Regional Transportation - <u>2045 Plan</u>, and the Oregon and Washington State Transportation Plans.

Air Quality Conformity

As a part of its compliance with <u>40 CFR 93</u>, which governs air quality conformity, the WWVMPO/SRTPO certifies that these amended projects will resurface and/or rehabilitate pavement, update pavement markings, and add guardrails. According to <u>40 CFR 93.126</u>, these projects are therefore exempted from the requirement to determine air quality conformity.

The agency thus finds that the projects included in this April 2024 Amendment to the 2024-2029 M/RTIP will not cause air quality to degrade to levels that would be in violation of the allowed standards for particulate matter with a diameter less than or equal to ten micrometers (PM₁₀).

Public Involvement

Citizens and interested parties are provided with the opportunity to comment on any M/RTIP amendment, as required under the IIJA Act.

The public review period for the April 2024 Amendment to the 2024-2029 M/RTIP will be held from March 5 through March 18, 2024. Public notices announcing the availability of the draft will be published in the newspapers of record. An electronic copy will be posted on the WWVMPO website at https://wwvmpo.org/public-participation.html.

Public comments received are included in Appendix C.

Conclusion

After review and analysis of the proposed changes and additions, and as called out in the previously mentioned findings, WWVMPO/SRTPO concludes that the April 2024 Amendment to the 2024-2029 M/RTIP is in compliance with the requirements of RCW 47.80.023 which governs regional transportation planning, 23 USC 134 and 49 USC 5303 which govern the metropolitan transportation planning process, as well as 42 USC 7401 (et seq.) and 40 CFR 93 which govern air quality and associated conformity determination.
